MESSAGE FROM OUR DCC PRESIDENT

Greetings from Dunkirk. The last time I wrote I was the acting camp manager, and now I am the new Board President. With both of these roles comes a lot of insight into the operation of Dunkirk. The Dunkirk Camp has many years under its belt, but as you will read in the article from the finance committee we may not have a lot of years ahead of us. When I became President I asked that a finance committee be formed with people with business backgrounds and experience in this area. We now have an extremely fine group of people looking out for Dunkirk. The committee has been meeting almost weekly, a huge commitment. Looking at our past track record we have finished each year in the red. This is not the way to keep a camp going, maybe that is why the United Church of Christ gave up on Dunkirk, **BUT WE WILL NOT GIVE UP.**

The Board of Trustees have been taking steps to move Dunkirk forward. The biggest step was hiring Julie LaGrow as our Conference Executive. Her job was to move Dunkirk forward and she has been really working hard in that direction. We had a number of special events, weddings and outside rentals last year and even more this year. The revenue from these has helped us. When you've seen the improvements to Mother's Memorial you see firsthand the impact she and Earl Arnold have had on the Camp. Earl has been a jewel in the Dunkirk crown. His hard work and dedication have saved us a lot of money. But as you all know, the Camp is old and we are still experiencing maintenance problems that we just cannot anticipate. Recent cabin electrical problems and problems with the pool and the sewer are only a few to mention. Earl is dealing with all of this and can still smile.

The second thing the Board has done is to empower the finance committee to make changes in the way we do business. We have realigned the role of the Treasurer to an overseer rather than the time consuming bill payer. We are now paying all the bills at Dunkirk and depositing all the money in the bank in Dunkirk. This allows us to pay our bills in a timely manner and to avoid delays. We now are using Quick Books for non-profit organizations, which is a vast improvement over what we have been using. The books are being revamped and we will have a clearer view of the financial footing of Dunkirk. The annual meeting of the Board will now be held in December and the new board members and officers will be elected at that meeting and will take office in January. This puts the board in line with Dunkirk's fiscal year.

Dunkirk sits on a Tripod, with three very important legs. The first leg is our camp program. The second leg is our special programs and outside rentals, and the third leg is YOU. We all know that the summer camping season alone will never cover

the costs of running the camp, but we still want to make it bigger and better. Julie and the Board have a lot of new ideas for doing just that. Our special events and outside rentals are being grown by Julie and the Camp Staff. Our week-long participation in the Chautauqua Fair running a food booth is just one of the new approaches. But again just special events are not enough to run the camp.

The third leg is the donations we receive from you, the supporters of Dunkirk. It is our hope that all three legs of support can become stronger and help us put Dunkirk into the black in the next few years. You are going to be asked to help with your leg in the near future. Please remember that without the continued generous support of people like you, we will not be able to keep the camp going. It is our goal to increase the two legs we have control of, and it is up to you and folks like you, to increase the third leg. I am confident that Julie and the Board will make a lot of progress in the next few years to close the deficit gap. We are counting on you to help us. God bless Dunkirk and the wonderful things that happen there. We are attempting to preserve the past while forging a new and brighter future.

BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS REPORT

As our camp ages, now in its 86th year, so do our buildings and facilities. 2008 has been a year bountiful with repairs, replacements and challenges.

Our pool and chlorine pumps broke down before the season even started. We were able to have the engines rebuilt and thankfully most of our camps were able to swim. Sadly, though, in August during a thunderstorm the pool pump engine was burned out. It cannot be fixed. Rather, it needs to be replaced and will be quite costly (est. \$3000). Fortunately, we were able to secure a donation to cover the cost.

Many of our cabins need serious electrical work done. In early summer we found, through me getting electrocuted in a cabin, that many are not grounded properly and that much of the wiring is faulty. This project is the priority for this winter. We want everyone to be safe and feel good about their stay here next summer. This electrical work will be expensive and we will be looking to the cabin sponsors to cover the cost. If anyone is interested there is opportunity to co-sponsor cabins and share the cost of repairs.

In planning financially for next year and the next couple beyond, realistically some equipment and the grounds will need work. Our dishwasher in the dining hall and hot water tank needs to be replaced, at an estimated cost of \$10,000-\$15,000. Among our other upcoming issues are:

- Drainage by Mother's – installation of a French Drain and the addition of gutters to keep erosion away
- Gator Utility Vehicles – they are beginning to wear out. Est. \$5,000-6,000 for a used one. This will be a necessity.
- Parking area - drainage will need to be addressed before a parking lot can be started.
- Sewers and storm drains – they need to be professionally cleaned out
- Cuppola – Installation is needed

This is to give you some idea of what we have on our list right now.

Unfortunately, our list grows faster sometimes than we can complete the work.

MOTHER'S MEMORIAL



Phase One of the renovations were completed in July. The repairs restored this building closer to its original beauty, enabling it to continue to be worthy of its noble purpose as a memorial to the fallen soldiers of WWI. The outside rooms are now large, airy, handicap-accessible bathrooms. The design, woodwork and features were kept in the original style to preserve the integrity of the building. A big "thank-you" goes out to Earl Arnold for his vision, leadership and expertise to make this dream a reality. Phase Two, a ramp to the upper area and a kitchenette/lounge, will be worked on as time permits and should be completed in 2010.



"DUNKIRK IS ALIVE WITH THE SOUND OF MUSIC"

Adult Music Camp was held the last weekend of August and was quite a bell-ringing success. In 2007 the camp was cancelled due to only nine registrants. This year the camp had 47 individuals register. The increase in the number of campers is attributed to reaching out to other denominations and the addition of new classes.

The camp is going through an evolution as it tries to reinvent itself as an institute for the development of creativity in music and worship. We are going to extend the camp and recreate it as a "conference," which would begin on Wednesday evening. Classes/workshops would be held on Thursday and Friday, and would be more in-depth and extensive than the traditional music camp activities. Starting on Friday night the format will revert to the original (standard) program. Interested people will be able to register for any single day or for the entire package.

The culmination of the conference will be a Sunday afternoon music festival.

"KUM-BY-YAH "This Song Shall Testify" Deut. 31:21

The founding of Camp CARING LOVE brings to mind verses from the beloved camp song which goes; "KUM BY-YAH". Adults with multiple physical and mental disabilities were crying because they could go nowhere on their own.

CARING LOVE, a camping program to meet their needs was formed by a group who heard their cries.

With full support of the managers and Board of Trustees, renovations began in 1984 to make DCC accessible to those wheelchair/walker dependent. Over the next few years with grants from the Buffalo and Margaret Wendt Foundations, along with numerous contributions, the gravel paths were widened and blacktopped. Wheelchair entrance ramps were added to enter the Dining Hall, Mother's Memorial, and the Classroom Building. In the five row cabins, grab bars went up in the bathrooms, sinks were lowered, and new toilets added to accommodate the wheelchair dependent. The addition of the special ramp to the pool made it possible to roll someone in a light weight canvas chair into the water.

A number of campers needed total care: Bathing, dressing, feeding or diapering. Others with speech problems made communication difficult. Four registered RN's dispensed medications several times a day. CARING LOVE allowed these individuals to enjoy the outdoors, the pool, crafts, and entertainment. "Kum-By-Yah" someone *is* laughing Lord!

The place is the fixture: a recollection submitted by Terry Schreiber Werth

Just the words "Dunkirk Conference Grounds" conjure up a host of images that began when I was in third grade and have endured, intact, for fifty more years: the sound of the lake as I sat at Vesper Point, the feel of wet, newly mowed grass on my feet as I plodded my way to flag-raising, the food smells and smiles of the dining hall and the heart-pounding, rousing singing before and after every meal, the cavernous feel of Mother's Memorial with the windows open and a stiff lake breeze blowing through, the dark, darkness of a starry night walking back to our cabins and the absolute stillness of cabin 10 after lights out. I remember the thrill of running up the steps into the main office to get registered. Who would be in my cabin? Finally! I was there AGAIN to make wonderful memories and then, of course, the inevitable tears and hugs when the week ended and parents drove slowly across the lawn to collect us. I went through all the stages: camper, junior counselor, counselor and co-director of a camp. Graduating through this progression seemed like a rite of passage. There was no question that I would take the next step.

Dunkirk was an enormous influence in my spiritual life. It was there I think I learned the most about reverence and stillness and simple worship. Eventually, my sister and my Dad served as counselors as well, and shared my love for and appreciation of this special place. My sister went on to join Covenant Players, whom she first saw perform there. And it was important to me that my daughter and her cousin share the Dunkirk experience, and they did. There are people, precious people, too many to name, whose faces appear in my mind when I think about my Dunkirk days. I was part of a team that brought together 16 teens from my church matched one-to-one with 16 children from an institution for a unique camp experience. One of the nine adults that came went on to full-time ministry. People still talk about the joys and challenges of that week!

It's good to know that the tradition continues, that this place evolves and endures so that other people might share the same sights and sounds and make more memories. The place, after all, is the fixture. It is the people that change: they keep the place alive, generation after generation. And it is God's gift, having touched thousands of lives in ways no one will ever know.

FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT

Many supporters of the Dunkirk Conference Center continue to ask the question "What is the financial stability of DCC?" We will now try and answer that question.

In the past, DCC had many financial benefactors that had "deep pockets". Many times those individuals would make up operating deficits before deficits were ever publicly disclosed. The benefactors were subsidizing Dunkirk, much like the church association did years ago. As time has passed and the benefactors are no longer among us, the DCC financial picture has grown quite challenging.

The current Finance Committee has reviewed historical financial reports and have determined that we are running at an annual deficit of approximately \$40,000 to \$50,000. Some of the past deficits have been overcome by taking money from an account we have on our books called 'Unrestricted Funds'. That fund sits with a balance of \$98,533.95 book value as of 9/30/2008.

We also have asset funds which we do not use for operational expenses. DCC's Endowment Fund has a balance of \$274,000 book value as of 9/30/2008. As this fund earns interest, it is reinvested back into the fund.

Our current Board of Trustees are earnestly looking at any and all ways to 1) Save Money and 2) Acquire Additional Capital. We have determined we have three sources of revenue: Camping Revenue, Event Revenue, and Contributions from Supporters. We need to increase revenue from all three sources in order to continue our DCC mission of committing to enrich the lives of children, youths, and adults in a Christian environment.
